PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

To Members of the Congress:

During 1954, more members have participated in the management of the Congress than at any time in its history. The Congress has developed into a laboratory or workshop in which every member has the opportunity to gain experience in several phases of the management of a national medical organization. This experience has already been useful to many individuals in their participation in other medical societies at local, regional and national levels.

Our programs have been designed to contribute to the postgraduate education for the young neurosurgeon. We have relied on our senior colleagues of unquestioned integrity and experience to conduct our scientific deliberations. However, the Officers and Executive Committee have been aware of the acute need for an expanding program of membership participation in our scientific sessions.
