


WELCOME TO VANCOUVER



CROSSING THE BORDER

Citizens or permanent residents of the United States can usually cross the border without difficulty or delay. However, certain types of identification are required by both Canada and U.S. Immigration. For native-born U.S. citizens, Canadian Immigration requires one of the following: passport, birth certificate or a voters registration card. For return entry, U.S. Immigration also suggests that you have one the the aforementioned, in addition to your normal identification. A permanent resident who is not a citizen is required to possess a 1551 or 1151 (the Green Card) by both U.S. and Canadian Immigration.

Citizens or permanent residents of other countries must have a valid passport and/or a valid visitors visa.

If you plan on bringing your own personal computer with you, please ensure that the computer is registered with U.S. Customs prior to leaving the U.S.A. This will ensure that you encounter no difficulties with U.S. Customs upon your return home. Other items that could cause a delay in your re-entry into the United States or other countries are newly purchased cameras or tape recorders. If your equipment looks or is new, please register such items with U.S./your country's Customs before entering Canada.

MONEY EXCHANGE

Please note that money can be exchanged at the airport, if necessary. Cabs will accept U.S. dollars or, in many cases, credit cards.
