THE SALMON WOMAN TOTEM

This Tlingit Tribal Totem, also known as the Fog Woman Totem, depicts the legend of the creation of the Salmon.

One version tells how the Raven, a supernatural being, became lost in a dense fog while fishing. Suddenly, a beautiful woman appeared and, taking Raven's spruce-root hat, caused the fog to disappear into it. Enchanted by her beauty and mystic powers, Raven married her.

One day, when Raven was away, Salmon Woman told a slave to get some water in Raven's hat and when he did so he was astonished to see a bright fish swimming in it. This was the first Salmon.

Raven was eager to learn how Salmon Woman had done this. She told him to build a large smokehouse, wait four days and then look for Salmon. The Raven did so and, true enough, on the fourth day the waters teemed with fish. Smoking and storing the Salmon, Raven became wealthy, but he soon forgot he owed his good fortune to his wife. He beat her and abused her until she ran away. Raven tried to catch her, but she eluded his grasp like a wisp of fog and drifted out over the waters, never to return. Hearing a strange noise, Raven turned around. His dried fish had come alive. Swarming down to the water, they swam away and Raven was as poor as before. But Salmon had been created and have remained to this day.
