





ART MUSEUMS

- M. H. de Young Memorial Museum Golden Gate Park. Permanent collections and art from Africa, Oceania, and the Americas as well as diversified European paintings and interiors. One of America's most popular museums. Open 10:00 to 5:00 daily 558-2887
- Asian Art Museum (The Avery Brundage Collection) Golden Gate Park ajoining the de Young Museum. Nearly half of this extensive collection is devoted to objects of Chinese origin. Magnificent jades and porcelains. The rest is divided among the arts of Iran. Turkey, Syria, India, Tibet and other Asian cultures. Open 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily 558-2993
- California Palace of the Legion of Honor Lincoln Park. Specializing in French arts and artifacts, the museum boasts a magnificent Rodin Collection, paintings from the 16th to the 20th centuries, splendid period rooms. The building, a copy of the Legion of Honor in Paris, also houses the Achenbach Foundation for the Graphic Arts, the largest graphics collection in the Western states. Open 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily. 558-2887
- San Francisco Museum of Modern Art Van Ness Avenue and McAllister (Civic Center) The nucleus of modern art in the Bay Area. An active traveling exhibition program brings important national and international work to the galleries. The permanent collection includes distinguished works of Matisse, Klee, Calder, Pollack, Motherwell and Still. Contemporary graphics and photography are also well represented. The museum has an excellent bookstore. 10:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Saturday and Sunday.

OTHER MUSEUMS

California Academy of Sciences Golden Gate Park (Just across from the de Young Museum and the Japanese Tea Garden) A major aquarium, a major planetarium and a major hall of science all under one roof. Steinhart Aquarium has over 15,000 living aquatic animals in beautifully illuminated tanks, alligators and reptiles safely confined in lush swamps and glass terrariums. Morrison Planetarium offers spectacular programs, science halls devoted to animals, plants, minerals and space. Open 10:00 - 5:00 daily 221-4214

Exploratorium

Palace of Fine Arts - Lyon Street near Marina Blvd. Located in the single remaining building from the World's Fair of 1915, this is an amazing collection of over 200 experiments in science, technology and human perception. Most exhibits involve individual participation. Wednesday to Sunday 10:00 to 5:00.

Oakland Museum

1000 Oak Street Oakland. For anyone who wants to enjoy a ride on Bart here is a wonderful destination in downtown Oakland. (Take the Fremont train, get off at Lake Merritt) You can combine a walk around Lake Merritt, a unique urban park and waterfowl refuge with a visit to the Oakland Museum, one of the architectural triumphs of the 1960's. This exciting new museum features natural sciences (including a fascinating transect of eight biotic zones across California), and unforgettable floor of California history (a must!) and a third section on California art. Open Tues-Thurs 10:00 - 5:00, Friday 10:00 - 10:00 Saturday 10:00 - 5:00 Sunday 10:00 - 6:00. Mrs. Marion Clark (one of our own auxiliary members) is a docent and will take tours on a pre sign-up basis Tuesday and Thursday. Please make arrangements in the Hospitality Suite.

POINTS OF INTEREST OUTSIDE SAN FRANCISCO

Muir Woods Just half an hour from the city, this National Monument is one of the few remaining stands of Coast Redwoods. The trees are awe-inspiring more than 7 feet thick, upwards of 200 feet tall, many over 2,000 years old. By stopping just across the Golden Gate Bridge you can also visit the Marin Headlands, a National Recreation Area (NRA) where you can experience close-up the rugged coastline, plunging cliffs and abundant sea bird life. Cronkhite beach glistens with jasper, jadite, and carnelian. Call 556-2920 for bus information.

Point Reyes National Seashore If you have time continue after visiting Muir Woods (or save this for a single adventure) north on U.S. 101 to this spectacular, unspoiled cape of broad, sandy beaches, ocean vistas and rugged coastal terrain. Drakes Beach, in the park, is where Sir Francis Drake beached the famous Golden Hinde on his trip around the world. There is a city bus trip which takes several hours. For information call 556-2920.

Berkeley Across the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge, Berkeley is the home of the University of California which has an architecturally significant campus with a noted museum designed by Ciampi. The campus and center of town are easily reached by BART. Book stores, boutiques and picturesque people abound. Get a map of landmarks and campus points of interest at the Student Union.

Angel State Park The largest island in San Francisco Bay, Angle Island covers about one square mile and is one of the few spots in California where you can wander totally removed from the sight, sound or smell of the automobile. Two hundred deer roam at will here sharing this preserve with cyclist, hikers and picnicers. The island offers a magnificent view from hiking and cycling trails. Harbor Tours operates frequent trips from Pier 43½. Call 982-1600 for information.

Sausalito and Tiburon Winding, wooded streets, houseboat havens, specialty shops, view restaurants and charm characterize these two communities in Marin County. Drive north over the Golden Gate Bridge or take the Ferry, an easy trip from the Ferry Building at the foot of Market Street.

Stanford University South from the city on Highway 280 (one of the nations most spectacular interstate drives) or on U.S. 101 Stanford encompasses many attractions. The Quadrangle at the core of the campus is distinctive. There is also the Hoover Institution for War, Revolution and Peace, Memorial Church and the Stanford Linear Accelerator. POINTS OF INTEREST

Alcatraz Once an infamous federal prison, also the site of the first lighthouse built on the Pacific Coast. Tours are conducted by the National Park Service between 9:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Harbor Carriers provide the transportation from Pier 43. Call for reservations 398-1141.

Cable Cars San Francisco is the only place in the world where you can ride on an historic landmark. For over 100 years a favorite means of transportation, today they are a symbol of San Francisco. Residents are so determined they remain that a guarantee to this effect was written into the city charter.

Powell and Mason Car: From downtown shopping district to Fisherman's Wharf.

Powell and Hyde Car: From downtown shopping district to Victorian Park (Ghirardelli Square and the Cannery)

California Street Car: From Van Ness to Market Street (At the bottom of California Street near the Hyatt Regency) via Nob Hill, Chinatown and the Financial District.

Cannery

Next to Fisherman's Wharf, this structure was once the old Del Monte fruit cannery. It has been transformed into a delightful complex of specialty shops, restaurants, art galleries and cafes. A fine place to stroll and browse.

Chinatown The largest Chinese community in the world outside of China. This city within a city continues to maintain a remarkable degree of autonomy. Chinatown offers a vast array of exotic shops, restaurants, food markets, temples, museums and venerable Chinese establishments. This is surely one of the most unusual spots in any American City.

Ghirardelli Square Housed in a 19th Century chocolate, coffee and woolen factory. Ghirardelli Square is now a multi-level blend of over 80 shops, restaurants, galleries and outdoor cafes. A charming place for strolling and shopping.

Golden Gate Park Once shifting sand dunes, Golden Gate Park is now the largest man-made park in the world. There are many points of interest within the park as well as miles of green lawn, over 5,000 kinds of plants, a paddock field with buffalo, lakes for rowing and model boat sailing, many sports activities. You won't want to miss!

The Japanese Tea Garden Take tea there from 8:00 a.m. to sundown everyday. Enjoy the Oriental landscaping, pagodas, moon bridge, bamboo grove and torii gates

The Conservatory of Flowers The oldest building in Golden Gate
Park and perhaps the most outstanding
example of Victorian architecture in
the Bay Area. Listed on the National
Register of Historic Places. The Conservatory houses continual tropical
garden and flower shows. Open daily
from 8:00 a.m. to 4:50 p.m.


Strybing Arboretum and Botanical Gardens Thousands of plants and flowers native to California and from all over the world. Close to the Tea Garden, deYoung Museum and the Academy of Sciences

- Grace Cathedral Near the Mark Hopkins and Fairmont Hotels atop Nob Hill, this is the seat of the Episcopal Bishop of California and one of the finest examples of Gothic Architecture in the United States.
- Mission Dolores Founded in 1776, the sixth of 21 missions established by the Franciscan Fathers in California. Moorish, Mission and Corinthian styles are combined in the mission church, believed to be the oldest structure in San Francisco. It has four-foot-thick adobe walls and hewn roof timbers lashed with rawhide. Open 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. daily. From Market Street take the "J" street car. Call 863-5112 for further information.
- North Beach Encompasses San Francisco's own Broadway of nightlife and entertainment, North Beach is also the "Latin Quarter" and the center of the local Italian community, where good Italian eating and import shops abound. Wander along Columbus Avenue and through the side streets to sample the colorful boutiques and cafes. Take a delicious delicatessen lunch out to Washington Square or stop for lunch at Mama's on the corner of the Square.
- St. Mary's Cathedral Located at Geary and Gough atop Cathedral Hill, new St. Mary's is an ediface of striking contemporary design. It is one of the city's glories, with its spacious plazas, and six-foot-wide stained glass windows which extend 139 feet down four sides of the structure to form a multicolored cruciform.

Telegraph Hill and Coit Tower Overlooking the entire North Bay picturesque and fashionable residential district, Telegraph Hill is the site of Coit Tower, a monument to San Franciso's volunteer firemen. Although once an art colony the name "Telegraph" stems from earlier days when semaphore was used to signal the town below of ships approaching through the Golden Gate. The information was then relayed to the financial district where trading would begin before the ships docked.

Union Street An intriguing place to browse and explore because of its tucked away charms. Passages lead to flower-filled courtyards along which lie boutiques and antiques. Many old Victorian homes have been artfully renovated and now house an attractive maze of shops. There you will find home furnishings, art and handicraft galleries, custom clothes, imports, restaurants and gift emporiums.
