

The Quests hope they will see you at the Congress of Neurological Surgeons' 37th Annual Meeting in Baltimore.


HISTORIC PAST, BRIGHT FUTURE

Baltimore, an exciting and historic city of 786,000, boasts an urban renewal program that serves as a model for port cities throughout the country. Its downtown area has been rejuvenated into a showplace for

visitors and residents, with careful attention paid to the preservation of the many fine historic buildings. Both the Charles Center and Inner Harbor renovations have won over 20 national and international awards, including in 1984, the prestigious American Institute of Architecture's Institute of Honor.

Among this dynamic city's many attractions are its new convention center which is prominently located in the heart of the city and Har

heart of the city, and Harborplace, the cornerstone of the Inner Harbor area. Harborplace is a rich amalgam of shops, restaurants, and waterfront cafés. Baltimore proudly claims many museums ranging from the Johns Hopkins Archaeological Museum and the Baltimore Museum of Art, to numerous smaller feature institutions such as the Cloisters Children's Museum and the Bal-

timore Museum of Industry. An array of fine restaurants offers a wide variety of ethnic dishes, year round fresh seafood, and in the fall, Baltimore's specialty: peppery, steamed blue crabs.

Baltimore enjoys a moderate climate, and fall weather is usually pleasant. Although daytime temperatures may be as warm as the mid-sixties, evening weather is considerably cooler. The area may experience its first frost in late October.

A fleet of motorized trolley cars make sightseeing in the city pleasant and easy in case of rain. During fair weather, the sights and smells of this historic city can be best experienced on foot.





BALTIMORE HIGHLIGHTS 1:00 pm - 4:30 pm

Discover the richness of Baltimore's history and renaissance. The tour begins at Harbor Place, the rejuvenated center of the city, which houses the World Trade Center, Harborplace, the National Aquarium, the Maryland Science Center and the U.S. Frigate Constellation (1798). It continues to nearby Mt. Vernon Place, one of the country's most elegant squares, with graceful townhouses, and the parks, Peabody Conservatory of Music with its magnificent five-tiered Library. Along the way you will view the historic neighborhoods of Otterbein and Federal Hill, whose treasured homes are the "Showplace of Old Baltimore." A stop at the world-famous Johns Hopkins Hospital Rotunda to see the statue of Christus Conslolator

and a visit to Fort McHenry where Francis Scott Key was inspired to write "The Star Spangled Banner," complete the afternoon.

Monday, October 26


FUN RUN 6:30 am - 7:30 am


COLONIAL ANNAPOLIS 9:30 am - 4:30 pm


Dana Day Meeting Chairperson

We look forward to seeing you at the 38th annual meeting in Seattle.





Michael Salcman, M.D. is Professor and Head of the Division of Neurological Surgery at the University of Maryland, and the director of the Neurotrauma Service at the University of Maryland Hospital.

Born in Pilsen, Czechoslovakia, he was exposed to the arts from an early age. At Boston University he attended a combined six year

program in liberal arts and medical education. In 1971 he began actively collecting art. He and his wife, Ilene, have conducted numerous tours of their personal collection for art groups. A former president of the Friends of Modern Art at the Baltimore Museum, he has also served on the accessions

committee of the museum's Board of Trustees as well as on the Executive Board of its Print and Drawing Society.

Dr. Salcman received his training at the University Hospital in Boston, the National Institutes of Health in Bethesda and the Neurological Institute of New York, Columbia University, where he was a resident in neurological surgery until 1976.

He has just completed his term as the secretary of the Congress and is currently chairman of the editorial board of its journal, *Neurosurgery*.

SHOPPING AT OWINGS MILLS MALL 11:40 pm - 4:45 pm


This shopping complex, one of Baltimore's newest and most fashionable, offers more than 160 fine specialty and department stores including Saks Fifth Avenue and Macy's.
