Airport Transportation: The airport is 8 miles from downtown. The cost is approx. \$25 by taxi. There is an airport express which runs every 30 minutes for \$8.25 per person. B.C. Transit: Consists of their city Buses, the SkyTrain, (runs from downtown Vancouver to the outlying areas) and the SeaBus (crosses Burrard Inlet every 15 minutes, connects downtown to North Vancouver).

After a 48 hour visit, U.S. Citizens can take home \$400 (U.S.) worth of goods every 30 days. This may include one litre of alcohol, 200 cigarettes and 100 cigars (not Cuban). Only \$25 worth of goods is allowed after a visit of less than 48 hours. Call 278-1825 for more information.

Sales Tax

A provincial sales tax of 7% is applied to most purchases with the exception of groceries, books and magazines. Goods shipped out of the province directly by the vendor are also exempt. A 7% federal Goods and Services Tax is also added to virtually everything you purchase except groceries. Non-Canadians can apply for a rebate of the tax on accommodation and consumer goods taken out of the country if the tax totals at least \$7 (but not for such things as restaurant meals, gas, tobacco, etc). Rebate application forms, available at most hotels, must be accompanied by receipts and mailed to Revenue Canada. For more information call (604) 536-7040.

ENJOY THE GARDENS

Bloedel Conservatory and Queen Elizabeth Park (872-5513)

From Cambie St., between 29th and 37th Ave.

Queen Elizabeth Park – Beautiful gardens around two quarries. The conservatory is Vancouver's only garden under glass, featuring a wide range of plants and free-flying birds.

Dr. Sun Yat-sen Classical Chinese Garden

578 Carrall near Pender in Chinatown

The Ming Dynasty-style garden is the first classical Chinese garden to be built outside of China.

Stanley Park

A 15 minute walk from the downtown area. One of the largest innercity parks on the continent. It encompasses 1000 acres. It's largest attractions are the aquarium and the zoo. This area is truly enjoyed by foot or bicycle. There are many paths that will take you through the dense forest in the middle of the park. The Forest consists of the Douglas fir, the tree most native to Canada. The ocean almost encircles the park, and along the shore are sandy beaches and a seawall with walkway that offers spectacular views. At Brockton Point you will find totem poles carved in the late 19th Century. There is a wonderful water park along the seawall for the kids to enjoy.

U.B.C. Botanical Gardens (822-4208)

6804 SW Marine Dr.

Enjoy the U.B.C. Botanical Garden of 80 acres of plants from around the world and the Nitobe Memorial Garden, an authentic Japanese Tea and Stroll Garden.

Van Dusen Botanical Garden (266-7194)

5251 Oak St.

55 acres of exotic plant, sculptures, lakes, and blooming displays.

WHAT TO SEE WHILE IN VANCOUVER AND AREAS CLOSEBY

Capilano Suspension Bridge and Park (985-7474)

3735 Capilano Rd. North Vancouver

The world's largest suspension foot-bridge 450 feet across and 230 feet above the Capilano River. It's fun to see the towering evergreens, totem poles and a native carving center.

CN IMAX Theatre (682-2384)

#201 - 999 Canada Place (on the waterfront)

A giant screen, 5 stories high and wrap around IMAX Digital Sound bring films to life.

Grouse Mountain - Theatre in the Sky (984-0661)

6400 Nancy Greene Way North Vancouver

A 100 passenger aerial tramway carries you to the 3700 feet level in minutes. At the top you can enjoy the multi-media Theatre in the Sky, Grouse Mountain Logging Shows, helicopter tours, horse driven carriage rides, scenic Peak Chair rides, children's adventure playground, and alpine meadows. Lunch and dinner facilities.

H.R. MacMillan Planetarium (736-4431)

1100 Chestnut St.

Take a journey through time and space, or gaze through the large telescope.

Reifel Bird Sanctuary (946-6980)

5191 Robertson Rd., Delta

Over 2 miles of trails lead to marshland habitats supporting more than 240 species of birds.

Science World British Columbia (687-7832)

1455 Quebec St.

B.C's premier science centre features hands-on activities.

Vancouver Public Aquarium (682-1118)

In Stanley Park

See the Beluga whales, the killer whales, and more than 8000 other animals in their natural habitats.

Shopping Areas

Chinatown – Pender St. for 2 blocks east and west of Main is the centre of Chinatown. The second largest in North America to that of San Francisco. There are wonderful Dim Sum restaurants to try.

Gastown – Water St. from Richards to Main St. is the heart of Gastown. This is the historical and oldest section of the city. A colorful area with boutique type stores.

Granville Island – An old industrial area which has turned over into a wonderful public food market, a Children's Only Mart, and many artist studios and galleries. A fun place to walk and browse.

Robson Street – A European style street with sidewalk cafes, boutique stores, and the hustle and bustle of shoppers.

Shopping Centres

Pacific Centre – Downtown underground mall connecting Eaton's, Holt Renfrew, Bay Co., Four Seasons Hotel, and the Vancouver Centre.

Royal Centre – 1055 W. Georgia. Over 55 smaller shops and services. Access by the skytrain and the Hyatt Regency Hotel.

Sinclair Centre – A unique shopping experience with 4 heritage buildings under glass in Vancouver's central business district.

Vancouver Centre – Under the Birk's clock at Georgia and Granville. 20 unique boutique shops in the downtown area.

THE PERFORMING ARTS

Arts Club Theatre (687-1644)

158 Johnston, Granville Island

The most active theatre in town, The Arts Club has two stages on Granville Island that operate year-round.

Queen Elizabeth Theatre and Playhouse (665-3050)

630 Hamilton near Georgia

The Q.E. complex houses the huge 2800-seat Queen E. Theatre and the smaller Vancouver Playhouse, a 650-seat theatre used by the resident Vancouver Playhouse Company. Usually six major Vancouver Playhouse productions run from fall to spring. Opera, dance and touring theatrical productions frequently hit the stage of the Q.E. Theatre.

Vancouver Opera Association (682-2871)

The VOA has been staging operas since 1960 and performs four major works a year, often with international stars. Season runs from Oct-May at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre.

Vancouver Symphony Orchestra (684-9100)

This group performs an eclectic mix of pops to traditional stars. Most concerts are at the Orpheum.

Ballet British Columbia (669-5954)

Ballet B.C. is young and fresh. It premiered in 1986. This company performs at the Queen Elizabeth Theatre.

ATHLETIC PURSUITS

Bicycling – The Vancouver Bicycle club meets Sundays at 10 AM at Broadway and Granville for a half-day trip in the city. Both beginners and

serious cyclists are welcome, but for safety's sake no small children. The club phone number is available from the Bicycling Association of British Columbia office at 737-3034. There are several bike paths in Vancouver, the best are in Stanley Park around the seawall, The Port of Vancouver, the route from False Creek-Granville Island-Vanier Park, and along Kitsilano Beaches. Bike rentals are also available in the city.

Jogging/Workout – The waterfront lends itself well to this activity, which allows for jogging paths in the downtown areas. The paths are the same for the cyclists, the Stanley Park seawall, Lost lagoon in Stanley Park, False Creek seawall, the English Bay area and Kits Beach/Vanier Park area. Workout facilities are offered within the hotels.

Golf – There are many golf courses throughout Vancouver. It is a sport which can be enjoyed year round. Call the B.C. Golf Association for details on courses 294-1818.

Hiking/Mountaineering – The Federation of Mountain Clubs of B.C. offers courses in all levels of mountaineering and rockclimbing, and leads backpacking trips into the interior of B.C. If interested only in a day trip, the Federation can provide you with a list of companies that offer shorter guided hikes. Call 737-3053.

Windsurfing – Windsurfing is a year round sport in Vancouver. There are schools which operate at various beaches in town and will supply everything you need. For more information call Windmaster 685-7245 or Windsure Windsurfing School 224-0615.

Professional Sports

Hockey – This is a very popular spectator sport in Vancouver. The local team, the **Canucks** began playing in 1970. For information call 254-5141.

Football – The B.C. Lions have had a rocky history. They won the Grey Cup in 1964, but by the next season were in last place. The Lions play all their games in the B.C. Place Stadium downtown for information call 685-4344.

Baseball - The highly popular Canadians of the Pacific Coast League are

a cult in Vancouver and their games often sell out. The stadium is at Ontario and 29th, on the east side of Queen Elizabeth Park. For more information call 872-5232.










CONVENTION CENTRE FLOOR PLAN



A Bit of Vancouver History

Vancouver is the youngest major seaport in the world. It was 100 years old in 1986. Vancouver is named after Captain George Vancouver who in 1792 first saw the magnificent north shore mountains which today look down on this busy seaport. Prior to this time this area was home to more than 3,000 native Indians.

"Gassy Jack" Deighton, in 1867 opened a saloon for loggers. He was a very colorful character and to many he is the founder of Vancouver. The area around his saloon grew rapidly to become known as Gastown

(officially it was incorporated as the town of Granville.

In 1886 the town of Granville, population 1000, became the city of Vancouver. In June of this same year the entire city was burned to the ground. The city was quickly rebuilt and had rapid growth at this time. After the fire the city council showed remarkable foresight by turning the First Narrows Military Reserve into a park. It was named after Governor General Lord Stanley, and is now know as Stanley Park.

This cosmopolitan city has close to 500,000 people within the city limits. The Greater Vancouver area has a population of 1.5 million.

Throughout the province, industry is based on mining, fishing and forestry. Vancouver is a major North American port because of its harbor and because it has the Canadian gateway for all cargo coming from and

going to Asia.

In 1986, Vancouver's centennial, the city hosted Expo 86. It was a world transportation exhibition. Canada Place, Vancouver's cruise ship terminal and trade and convention centre, officially opened. A rapid transit service called SkyTrain began operation from downtown to the outlying areas.

Today, Vancouver bustles as a thriving city with much to offer it's inhabitants. It has been said that a person can go skiing and sailing in the same day. Whether it be the peaceful waters, the glistening mountains, the opulent shops, or the sidewalk cafes, this is truly a place for everyone to

enjoy.

EXPLORING THE SURROUNDING AREAS

Whistler – The site for this year's post Convention meeting. Whistler is 120km (75mi) north of Vancouver. A relatively new area only 16 years old. In just over a decade it was transformed into a major international ski resort. In the last few years Whistler has developed into a wonderful place to go in the summer. Whistler is known for it's spectacular mountain biking trails. The ski lifts are open to take you up with your bike to ride down the mountain. An exhilarating ride. There is paragliding or heli-hiking along with hiking trails for all levels. The layout of Whistler Village is quite unusual and has won design awards. It's a compact little town with everything no more than a five-minute walk away. It's town centre is for pedestrians only.

Victoria On Vancouver Island – Victoria is the provincial capital of British Columbia. It is a romantic city that has become a tourist mecca. It is best known for its English gardens. Most believe it is the last light of British imperialism to set on the Western hemisphere. It is charmed with London-style double decker buses, lost of Irish linens and Harris tweeds, and sipping afternoon tea. Don't miss the **Buchart Garden** just 21 kilometers north, 50 acres of beautifully manicured gardens.

Gulf Islands – The Gulf Islands form a cluster between the mainland and the south end of Vancouver Island. The only public access is by ferry, so the islands have stayed undeveloped.
